He has also been chosen as recipient of the State of Wisconsin Academic Excellence Scholarship. Mack holds the highest weighted grade point average (GPA) in the senior class at Somerset High School, which determined his status as valedictorian.

Mack is the son of David and Kelly Ott. His younger brother, Zachary, is a sophomore at Somerset High School.

After graduation Mack plans to attend college to pursue a degree in Aerospace Engineer-

ing. Mack has had an interest in the aerospace field since he was very young and has been encouraged by his family over the years to pursue an education in engineering. These students have committed long hours to academics and extracurricular activities throughout their high school careers, and the following is just a brief snapshot of them.

Eighteen members of this senior class were members of National Honor Society. Members assisted in recruiting volunteers, setting up appointments, and working at three NHS sponsored blood drives during the school year. Four seniors participated in Sign Theater. They transcribed a song into ASL (American Sign Language) and helped teach the song to middle school and elementary school students.





MOCK TRIAL 2010

A man receiving therapy for drug abuse and violent behavior is discharged from a clinic. He proceeds to go home and murder his girlfriend before committing suicide. Now the girlfriend's mother is suing the clinic where the man received treatment. Is the clinic fully or partially liable for the death of the girlfriend?

This is the question put before students in the 2009-2010 Mock Trial case. Students began to investigate this case in October. Meeting sometimes three times per week during their lunch periods, ten brave students ranging from sophomores to seniors attempted to try this case before actual Wisconsin judges.

The students were Parker LeMire, Matthew Schmitt, Dakota Belter, Dana Carlson, Jonathon Voss, Brooke Donohoe, Stephanie Berg, Ashley Bennett, Anthony Howe, and Anne Plourde. Schmitt, Voss, and Howe were attorneys, while Belter, Carlson, Donohoe, Berg and Bennett acted the part of witnesses. Plourde was a court timer.

These students had several reponsibilities. First, they had to learn proper court procedure. To that end, two real attorneys volunteered their time to teach students about how to call witnesses to the stand, how to present evidence, how to ask questions properly, how to investigate a case, and how to present a side of this case. The two attorneys were Christopher Anderson and Joel Schlitz. The second responsibility students had was to read the testimony of people involved in the case. Lawyers had to read testimonials in order to figure out what questions to ask each witness. Students who would act the part of witnesses had to memorize their lines so that they could "become" these people. Students also had to rehearse questions, answers, and arguments over and over again. Opening and closing statements were written, edited and re-edited.

On February 13, 2010, these ten students traveled to Eau Claire for the Regional Mock Trial tournament. Somerset competed against schools from Western Wisconsin. The format of Mock Trial requires that one school acts as the plaintiff, while the other school acts as the defendant. Over the course of the day, Somerset completed three versions of the same trial.

Since there is no verdict given at the end, some people might say that Mock Trial does not adequately

mimic how an actual civil trial operates. And while it is true that no verdict is issued, the judges at these trials do grade schools on their performance. Somerset's regional was filled with some outstanding schools, and Somerset ended up placing in the top ten in the Regional. More importantly, students were able to get a feel for what it is like to be involved in the legal process.

Any student who is thinking about a career in law or criminal justice may want to consider taking part in Mock Trial next year. Those students who like to act or who enjoy debating may also want to consider this extracurricular activity.



STATE FORENSICS 2010

Seven students qualified for the State Forensics competition this year. The State competition is held during the month of April in Madison each year and is sponsored by the Wisconsin High School Forensics Association.

Rachel Verdeja, a junior, qualified in the Farrago category. She combined three pieces of literature (a song, a play and a short story) on the central theme of "Imagination" and how it is important that we keep using our imaginations as we grow older. Freshman Emilee Martell qualified in the Solo Acting (Humorous) category. She performed a monologue entitled, "French Toast," which is about the trials and tribulations of a teenage matchmaker. Grace Becher, also a freshman, qualified in the Solo Acting (Serious) category. She took on the persona of a fetus in "Diary of an Unborn Child," which is one author's perspective on abortion. Somerset School District announces the retirement of Pam Powers, Somerset High School Family & Consumer Education (FACE) Teacher. She has been the FACE teacher at Somerset High School since the beginning of the 1994-1995 school year, and Somerset students have benefited from her knowledge and expertise for the last 16 years. Mrs. Powers taught middle and high school students in grades 7 – 12 for two years at what is now the Somerset Middle School building. Chuck is looking forward to spending more time with his wife, Gail, three children, ten grandchildren and the newest member of the family, a great-grandson!



Somerset Middle School entered five Destination Imagination teams for regional competition that was held at Chippewa High School on March 27th. Three teams competed at the state level, which was held at the UW-Stevens Point campus, on April 17th.

At the high school level, classes will again be offered in the areas of remediation and Weight Training and Conditioning.




1st GRADERS MAKE CONNECTIONS



District Goals Update

The Somerset School District has a five-year Strategic Plan, 2006-2011. This plan provides the district with our focus. Within each year of the plan we set annual district-wide goals. The accomplishment of our annual goals leads us to successful completion of our five-year Strategic Plan. The 2009-2010 district-wide goals were evaluated in April by teachers, administrators, and the Board of Education. Added to the goal document in April was the End of the Year Progress update for each action step listed on the goal docu-

ments. These goals are available for your review on the district web site at: www.somerset.k12.wi.us.

As we finalize the 2009-2010 goals, we begin the goal process for the 2010-2011 school year. The 2010-2011 goals were crafted in April by the Board of Education and administrative team. In May of each year our administrators and teachers finalize our goals by completing the action plan portion of the goal document. During the coming school year district employees implement the action plans in each of our schools. Come April of each year, the whole process cycles and continues on for the next school year.

Our district-wide goals move from the board room to the classroom. The aligned and common goal process has a focus on improving student achievement. The specific focus of our three goals was on teaching and learning, character education, and community involvement. The 2010-2011 district wide goals will be on our web site in June, 2010.

Facility Planning – Standalone Building

A building is being built on the Somerset Campus to provide district office, junior kindergarten, early childhood, virtual education, and alternative education classroom spaces. Moving these offices and program spaces out of the schools will free up space in the high school and elementary school for additional classrooms. The new building provides a short-term solution to our space needs. Future enrollment numbers will determine future space needs.

The building is scheduled to be completed by the start of the 2010-2011 school year. The building will be paid for out of district funds, therefore, there is no need for a referendum or an increase in local taxes to cover the cost of this building. The building is 11,000 square feet in size and will cost approximately \$1.3 million. This building will be located between the high school and the elementary school and just south of the varsity soccer field. The new building project acts as a Somerset stimulus package, as is has created numerous jobs for Somerset residents.

RETIRING ADMINISTRATOR - RICK LANGE

When you look for a picture of a Spartan Mascot in the dictionary, an encyclopedia, or on the internet you will more than likely see a picture of our recently retired middle school principal, Rick Lange. He exemplifies what it means to be a Somerset Spartan. Rick is a quality guy, a great educational leader, and a supporter of anything Spartan; he will be missed by everyone.


Ron created our director of curriculum and instruction position. He has lead

CURRICULUM & INSTRUCTION DEPARTMENT NEWS

Strategic Plan

The Somerset district will enter into the last year of the current 2006-2011 Strategic Plan with the coming fall. A brief assessment as to how the plan has progressed to date is in order.

First, the plan is organized around four areas of concentration; (1) Curriculum, Instruction and Assessment (2) Character Education (3) Career Education, and (4) Community Involvement. To meet the nine objectives under these four broad topics, 44 action steps have been in progress since the implementation of the plan in 2006.

By the actions of the 119 teachers and building administrators, over 90% of the 44 action steps have been met or are ongoing practices that teachers and students have infused into daily school life. Such actions as infusing Smartboard technology into classrooms, interacting with students in other nations via the internet, implementing groups of learners by their learning style or knowledge level, establishing thematic units whereby students utilized many subjects simultaneously, infusing character education into every student's life, implementing a clear career component into middle and high school lessons and through global and community activities like the Empty Bowls project, are all products of objectives laid out in the current Strategic Plan.

One significant element of the plan yet underway involves exposing all students to global or world languages. Rather than focus on one specific language for reading, writing and conversation fluency, the district is taking an approach that will expose students to a variety of world languages and the cultures of those languages. This approach, through a program titled Rosetta Stone, is in the beginning stage of being piloted by select teachers, with the possibility of being used by a large number of staff members.

As the current Strategic Plan comes to a close, the next iteration of the Somerset vision plan will come into being. Watch for information in next fall's district newsletter for this next step in the future of education in our community.

Testing

Standardized tests come in two 'flavors' in the Somerset district – state mandated exams and district-selected assessments.

The former, titled Wisconsin Knowledge and Concepts Examinations, or WKCE, for short, are administered to students in the fall of each new school year. These tests are given to all students in only the 4th, 8th and 10th grades, in the five core subjects of reading, math, language arts, science and social studies. Students are measured against a 'bar' set by the state and deemed 'minimal', 'basic', 'proficient' or 'advanced' based on how they achieved against the 'bar.'

Those results from last November's WKCE exams have just been released and are being analyzed for publication by the district. The public release of state test data has been set for May. A district Assessment Report is available each July from the office of the curriculum director, or by calling 247-4400, ext. 515.

By contrast, MAP – or Measures of Academic Progress – are district-purchased tests that 'branch' to allow each student to demonstrate the level of knowledge that each one has individually. Given three times per year to 3rd through 10th graders, twice to high school juniors and once to seniors in four subjets, MAP tests are taken on computers, produce an immediate score for student and teacher use, and pinpoint specific strands of knowledge deficiencies. MAP tests are increasingly being used by all district teachers to 'take students' temperatures' frequently in terms of learning and apply remediation as warranted.

The district is currently in the midst of the third, or spring, test 'window' which will conclude in mid-May. MAP results are either sent home to parents or discussed with them through their student during spring and fall parent-teacher conferences.

NEWS FROM THE DISTRICT'S BUSINESS OFFICE

Budget

Presently, the district is the process of preparing the 2010-2011 budget for the school board to review in May and adopt in June. At its simplest level, the budget has two elements: revenues (money coming in) and expenditures (money going out). It's a lot more complex than that, obviously, but we need to make sure that those two sides of the equation are balanced.



The challenge is that we don't know what our revenues will be. Ninety-five percent of the revenues for our operating budget come from state aids and property taxes. The total of those are set by the State through the revenue limit law and is based, in part, on how many students are going to be attending school on September 17th. Looking back at enrollment patterns, we can estimate this number, but we really won't know for sure until the fall. At this point, revenues for next year are projected to be just over \$18 million.

On the other side of the equation, expenditures, we have more data. For example, about 75% of our budget goes to personnel costs and we have negotiated settlements (one pending ratification) with the two organized employee groups in place for next year. We have identified non-personnel costs – for everything from paper and pencils, to computer equipment, to custodial services and our bus contract. In total, the estimated expenditures for 2010-2011 is about \$18.2 million.

Two big pieces of this budget are two initiatives to improve student learning. The first is funding for a new building on campus which will be the new home for Junior Kindergarten, Early Childhood, the Virtual Ed and Alternative Ed programs, as well as the district's administrative offices. This will free up space at the elementary school and at the high school so that we may decrease class sizes. This project is being completed without asking for additional tax revenues from the community. It will be paid for within the dollars that the district already receives.

The other initiative is a staffing plan that will increase the number of teachers by more than 5½ to lower teacher-pupil ratios. We will be adding staff in core academic areas at the high school and we are increasing the number of teachers for JK and Kindergarten. These will lead to smaller class sizes and allow teachers to provide more time and attention to all students. In addition, there will be more teaching time for music and physical education. We are also examining adding increasing art instruction as well.

There will be updated information on the budget in the next district newsletter in August.



Transportation

We are excited to be continuing our transportation contract with Safe-Way Bus Company. Earlier this year the school board approved a new contract with Safe-Way. We will be working with Safe-Way on routing over the summer. Look for information over the summer if you qualify for bus routes. Bus routes will be set in early August, so if you have special transportation needs (such as day care), please contact Mary W at the district office during the summer (715.247.3313, ext. 506).

Food Service


This summer, the school board will review food service operations and meal prices. Meal prices, whether they change or not, will be listed in the August newsletter.
